Trade/Technical/Vocational School

A trade school, also known as a technical or vocational school, is an educational institution that exists to teach skills related to a specific job. Trade schools are a more streamlined approach to education, focusing on a particular career specific skillset rather than receiving a general education. Trade schools typically take a lot less time to complete, have smaller class sizes, and the majority of the training is hands on. There are a variety of advantages to attending a trade school including:

- Salaries for trade school graduates aren't that much less compared to a four-year degree.
- Studies show that at the current rate of growth in trade jobs there will be more positions available than persons trained for the job providing high job availability. One reason is that according to Forbes, skilled trade workers are a disproportionately older population and will only continue to get older, creating increased opportunities for young workers to fill their shoes.
- Trade school graduates are able to enter the workforce at least two years earlier than those attending a four year institution.
- The average trade school degree costs \$33,000 compared to a \$127,000 bachelor's degree average.

Community College

The traditional four-year college experience or going directly into a four year college program isn't for everyone. Some students aren't sure what they want to study, while others are looking for a more affordable education. Below are some of the reasons why attending a community college might be the best choice for some high school graduates:

- Shorter time frame: Most programs at a community college are two years or less, allowing the student to enter the workforce sooner than a four year program student.
- **Money:** Although tuition costs are expensive across the board, the cost of community colleges are still significantly more affordable than most four year institutions.
- Easier Admission Policies: Community colleges often have an "open door" admission policy that means anyone can register for the school as long as he or she has a high school diploma or GED. Although community colleges may ask for SAT or ACT scores as a part of the admission process, these tests do not typically keep students out of the school like they might with many four-year institutions. For high school graduates with low GPA's, community colleges offer a chance to start on a postsecondary education. This gives students the opportunity to pull up their GPA having a better chance of entering into the four year program of their choice.
- **Flexibility:** Often community college schedules are much more flexible than those provided by four year institutions. This is good for those that find they need to work while in college or for adults juggling professional and family responsibilities along with their studies.
- **Smaller campus:** Some students may find a smaller campus and class sizes are more comfortable right after leaving high school.
- Hands on Experience: Because many community college programs tend to focus on preparing students for the professional world, they offer many hands-on experiences that might not be available at a four year school.
- Post-Degree Options: After community college, graduates have a number of
 post-degree options to pursue including moving directly into the workforce or
 transfering to a four year school.
